Recently we received a donation from a family who has a change saving program of their own, but it's not what you are thinking. At the end of each day Larry and Joan Sherman unload their spare pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters into a coin jar. They have been collecting loose change in this way ever since their college years and early on had used it for projects around their home or for family trips. Now that their children are out of the house, the Sherman's have found themselves in a position to use their coin jar to give back to their community.
